Yeah, well, I come from both of my parents work in the film industry. So I've always sort of had a lot of exposure to movies through them. But for some reason, I never actually wanted to go into film production, there was just always that side of me where I wanted to, I just felt better talking about movies, and I got more joy out of talking movies, rather than making them up. But, um, and I just, you know, it really started when I was just doing it for fun. Writing small movie reviews on this site no longer exists. But flixter.com. It used to be part of I think Facebook used to own it. At one point, I just started doing written reviews there. And it took me a couple of years before I actually started transitioning to doing video reviews on YouTube, because I always hated how my voice sounded. But eventually, once I got into college, I overcame that fear. And over time, like I just started talking about movies, as made an effort to try to see as many new releases as possible while reviewing some old ones, whether they be good or bad. And that's pretty much how I ended up where I am now.

And, like you're not, your goal is to not change their mind about it, because that's going to be a very impossible task. And if you keep obsessing with trying to change everyone's opinion on a movie that you have a different opinion on, then it's gonna be a no win situation. But it's sometimes it's a little difficult to understand why people don't like a certain movie that you love. For example, last year, David Fincher is man, I really love that movie. And a lot of his mainly because of the way it was made to act like a movie that was made during the 1940s, to where they had to basically relearn how to make movies from that decade. But a lot of people in my critics guild didn't like it so much. They didn't say it was bad. They were just like, no, it's fine. It's a fine movie. And again, I just have to pull myself back and just be like, Oh, come on, really. But what about this? So it's, it's again, it takes a lot of trial and error.

And it was ad libbed. There were notes but it felt very natural. And that's how I want my reviews to come off. I want to come across like I'm having a conversation with somebody else rather than actually reading a script. And just going down note beat for beats on everything that I want from a movie or everything that I like. dislike about whatever movie I'm talking about his Do you think there's such thing as objective film criticism? Absolutely it because I can tell you there are a ton of movies that you people will have disagreements on. And the people that really either like or dislike a movie, they're probably going to have certain personal feelings towards sad movie and an example that I could give right off the bat is A Bug's Life. kind of a weird example. But as the years as I got older, I realized that Bug's Life tends to fall into like, everyone's bottom list of Pixar movies in the sense that it's not as beloved as I thought when I was a kid. And there's a lot of personal attachment that I have to that movie that only I can understand. So I can't again, films incredibly subjective. And it's ultimately like your opinions. Whether it's your personal like relationship to a movie, what a certain movie reminded you of that it's movies are going to affect you in very different ways. And even with the negative side, if there's a movie that tackles a subject matter that you personally find offensive, then that's like, that's your what who you are. It's not really fair to sometimes I don't think it's fair to really criticize a movie for its personal for something that it does that you personally find offensive. But that's just who you are.

What would what mood was I in to where I just didn't like this? Because if I could go back in time and like, tell my 20 year old self. Hey, you're actually going to really like bridesmaids later on? I thought my older self would be crazy. Because that like yeah, my opinion for those both of those movies has really changed.

That's probably the most important advice that I can give anyone. You can be inspired by other people who are doing movie reviews on YouTube, like Chris Stockman or double toasted, but don't try to copy that image. If you try copying what they do, then you're not going to get the full attention. If you just be yourself and you be completely honest with your opinions, and no matter how controversial they might be, you'll stick out and you'll get people who come in and go, you know what, I don't agree with this person. But he's very honest about what he's saying. So I like him or her. Yeah, just Just don't be afraid to be yourself. And don't be afraid of trying to go along with the general public and what they think if you really feel like there's a movie out there that everyone's loving that you just don't tell them how much you don't like that movie. But on that same note, if I were to give another piece of advice, don't dedicate your crit bulk of your criticisms to negativity. And it's very important that you celebrate movies and celebrate the stuff that you love, rather than just utterly focusing on the stuff that you hate. That will definitely make you from personal experience talking about the stuff that you love, rather than the stuff that you hate, will help with your mental health.
